As some of you may already know from media websites and the press release on our own website, the large cargo plane we had chartered, which was loaded with the lighting towers and generators that MHIA and the non-profit organization Operation USA had donated, and also with other relief supplies, left Miami for Haiti last Saturday, February 6th.



These supplies arrived at Santo Domingo Airport in the Dominican Republic the same day, and were taken over through Operation USA's arrangements to the non-profit organization International Medical Corps, which supports medical and relief activities in the afflicted area. According to the news today from Operation USA, our relief supplies have already been put to use in Saint Damian's Hospital and other facilities in Port-au-Prince, Haiti, to ease the suffering of earthquake victims and to improve their daily lives.

It is our sincere desire for us at MHIA to be good corporate citizens in the United States at any given time, and we have considered how we could best utilize our limited resources as much as possible, to support areas affected by a catastrophe such as this.



We were able to make these difficult and very challenging relief efforts happen this time by taking advantage of our wide business specializations (including airplane-related businesses), and also by expanding on the usual support we have provided in the past, in that we coordinated the transportation itself to the disaster area, including chartering a cargo plane.
